#### **Executive Summary**

Pursuant to the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 13. A.08.01.12, *Arrest on School Premises*. The *Student Arrests Data Collection Manual* was developed to provide guidance to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) on the collection of student arrests data for the 2019-2020 school year. The information herein is aimed to provide clarity to questions and concerns put forth by LEAs from prior years' collection efforts to better streamline the data collection process.

Student arrests that should be reported to the MSDE are arrests that occur as a result of a *physical arrest* or a *paper arrest/student referral* to law enforcement or to the Department of Juvenile Services (DJS) by school personnel for a disciplinary-related offense that was committed on school property or at an off-campus school activity.

Offenses that occur in the community or away from school are known as *reportable offenses*. Reportable offenses should **NOT** be included in the student arrests data collection. By statute, law enforcement officers are required to report to school system personnel when they arrest a student in the community for particular crimes set forth in the statue. Md. Code Ann., Educ. §7-303. The purpose of this statute is to provide information to school personnel so that they can develop a plan to keep the school safe and yet, serve the educational needs of the offending student. See **COMAR 13 A.08.01.17.** 

#### **Purpose**

In January 2014, the Maryland State Board of Education adopted new regulations guiding student discipline. The regulations were designed to strengthen student retention and graduation rates, while serving to determine whether a school-to-prison pipeline exists in some schools or school systems. The regulations require annual reporting of arrests based on referrals by school officials to law enforcement agencies or the Department of Juvenile Service systems for disciplinary offenses occurring on school property or during off campus school activities, including on the school bus.

The arrest information is reported on an Excel spreadsheet, provided by the MSDE, which captures the categories in the *Data Definitions and Instructions* section of this manual. The spreadsheet utilizes a dropdown menu to provide quick and easy responses from the local school systems. The data is compiled for a report to the State Board of Education and a report to the Maryland legislature.





**3.** Changes to selections in the dropdowns will trigger edit errors (see below). **Responses must be reported exactly as they appear on the spreadsheet and in the reporting manual**. See Appendix B for validation errors and requirements.



- **4.** If student was charged with multiple offenses for the same incident, report only the most serious offense. For example, if a student is charged with fighting and firearms. Firearms is the more severe of the two offenses.
- **5.** After data has been edited and considered final, the LEA contact will receive summary reports from MSDE for verification. If reports are accurate, the superintendent of schools must sign and return the verification form, Appendix C, by the due date.
