Session 10 LEARN: Electronic Graphic Organizers (Inspiration Software)



Session 10 is a shift from the last few sessions in which we have been focusing on big ideas. This session, we'll go back to the work of **trying out a new tool** in the context of the classroom.

LEARN: In session 10, you will be using Inspiration software, which is available on every MCPS computer. If you'd like to use it at home, you have several options for installing it. You might want to plan ahead so that you have access to the software before session 10 begins.

Download a Free Trial: A free trial will work for 30 days, which should be plenty of time for you to complete this session and more.

Get the install disk from your school: In some districts, Inspiration has been purchased as a site license with home use rights for teachers. In MCPS, your media specialist should have an installation disk for you to use. If there are questions, refer to this home use document. If the CD is lost or damaged, a new one can be requested from the Help Desk.

Buy It: Inspiration costs \$30 and can be downloaded for instant purchase.

What makes a digital version of the old classroom standby - the graphic organizer - so powerful? You'll use Inspiration to explore many different uses - as a way to present information, a pre-writing organization tool, to a way to structure a project, or a tool for student expression.
