Montgomery County Executive Marc Elrich is holding several budget forums to seek input from residents about Fiscal Year 2021 (FY 21) Operating Budget priorities. The forums are scheduled for:

- **Wednesday, November 13 – 7:00 p.m.** – Eastern Montgomery Regional Services Center, 3300 Briggs Chaney Road, Silver Spring, Maryland 20904

ESOL Grading and Reporting

On report cards, ESOL student will receive a performance level for listening, speaking, reading and writing. This level is based on their ESOL classroom performance and assessments.

ESOL Essential Questions for Kindergarten:

We use language to express who we are.

- What words describe each of us?

We can gain information through written and oral language.

- What words can we use to describe things?

Asking questions helps us learn and work well with others.

- What language do we use when we work together in school?
- How do we ask questions for clarification?

The language we use expresses how we organize information.

- What language do we use to describe objects or describe the actions or groups of categories of?

ESOL Essential Questions for First Grade:

How do communicating and working with others help you learn?

Working together allows me to learn new words and ideas because they are repeated many times.

How does identifying similarities, differences, or patterns help you understand how ideas are related?

Practicing sentence patterns helps me understand how words are related and how to better express myself in English.

How does breaking down a whole into parts help you understand the whole?

Observing details and learning words to describe them helps me understand and explain how parts are related to the whole.

How do sorting and classifying help you make sense of information to solve problems?

Explaining why things fit or don't fit into categories helps me make sense of new information and solve problems.

How do communicating and working with others help you learn?

Listening to my classmates' ideas and adding my own ideas helps me learn.

Hello families, I hope everyone is able to get outside and enjoy this beautiful weather. If you are looking for a great local place to go for a hike, I recommend Sugarloaf Mountain. My daughters and I go there often and it is a beautiful, free local resource with many different levels of trails to meet the needs of everyone's comfort levels.

This month in Physical Education, Kindergarten students will be working on catching a self-thrown ball.

First grade students will be working on executing an underhand throw in addition to catching an underhand thrown ball.

Second grade will work on throwing a ball to a stationary target in addition to catching an overhand thrown ball.

Third grade students will be working on executing an overhand thrown ball at different levels. In addition, they will focus on catching at different levels.

Fourth grade students will be focusing on throwing to a target that is moving right or left. In addition, they will concentrate on catching thrown balls while moving right and left.

Fifth grade will focus on throwing to a target which is moving away from them. Additionally, they will focus on catching a thrown ball while moving away from the passer.

Music Newsletter From Mrs. Holden!

Kindergarten has been working on our musical opposites: loud/soft, fast/slow, long/short, and same/different. We are continuing to explore our voices and the sounds they make. We are also working on using our bodies to keep a steady beat.

First Grade has learned how to identify and read quarter notes and two beamed eighth notes. When we are reading these in rhythms we call them Ta and Ta-ti. Students have also been practicing using their inner hearing, or audiation. In November we will be continuing to practice reading rhythms as well as working on how to keep a steady beat using instruments.

Second Grade has been working on identifying and reading half notes. When we are reading these in rhythms we call them Ta-a. Students have been practicing their inner hearing, or audiation, in order to decode rhythms containing half notes. This month we are learning about the different families of the orchestra in preparation for our field trip to Strathmore on November 20th.

Third Grade has been working on identifying and reading four beamed sixteenth notes. When we are reading these in rhythms we call them Ta-ka-ti-ki. In November we are going to continue working on songs that use the pentatonic scale and whole note and whole rest rhythms.

Fourth Grade has been working on songs that use the I chord and the V chord by playing the ukulele. Students have been using the F and C chords to accompany themselves as they play songs. In November we will be continuing to explore I and V chords in music as well as singing rounds and exploring musical phrases.

Fifth Grade has been studying the 12-bar blues in preparation for our field trip to Strathmore that took place in October. In November we will take the chords we learned and apply them to partner songs (two songs that can be sung together in harmony at the same time). We will also continue to work on proper singing technique and adding expressive qualities to our singing.

Chorus is hard at work learning new songs. Students have been focusing on singing with proper technique and breath support. In November we will continue to work on singing in harmony.

Art Updates:

In Mrs. Bauer's classes **Kindergarten** students experimented with mixing primary colors (red, yellow & blue) to make secondary colors (orange, green & purple). Students painted papers with the colors they mixed, then used the papers to make a pumpkin collage. Students worked on cutting and gluing skills while creating their artwork. **First graders** looked at the work of illustrator & author Eric Carle. Students learned that Eric Carle makes his own papers that he uses for his collages. The class decorated a variety of papers using materials such as texture plates and watercolor paints. First graders also worked on cutting and gluing skills as they created their own landscape creature collages using the papers they created as a class. **Second graders** observed illuminated letters in a variety of texts. Students began to design their own illuminated letter, which they then transferred to foam and printed multiple times using the correct printmaking process. **Third graders** started to work on their clay bird bath sculptures. First students created two pinch pots made out of clay, then attached them together to create their bird bath. Next, students carved designs into their clay and attached clay birds. Finally, students will paint their clay bird baths with glaze to make it colorful and shiny. **Fourth graders** learned about the element of art called value. Students used paint to mix different values of a color adding white to create a tint, adding black to create a shade and adding black and white to create a tone. After painting their background paper with tints, shades and tones, students then painted black shapes on top to create a silhouette. There is a lot of creativity going on in the art room!

Students have been hard at work in the Art Room! In Kindergarten, students are finishing up a watercolor painting of an ice cream cone, inspired by artist Wayne Thiebaud. We used patterns and oil pastels to add detail! Next, we will begin to explore tempera paint while using shapes and lines to draw dinosaurs! First grade is finishing up our fruit bowl still life paintings, and will soon begin a new lesson on learning about the different parts of a landscape. We will draw what is near and far with a horizon line and add some fall elements to our pictures with paint. Second grade just learned about Positive and Negative shapes in a composition while working on a collage, and will now switch gears to focus on using value to turn a circle into a sphere while making an out-of-this-world space picture! Third graders are about to learn about artist John James Audubon and his scientific illustrations of birds. We will get bird books from the library to use while we talk about proportion and color, and using different techniques with both colored pencils and chalk for our pictures. Fourth grade is going to review radial symmetry in a very detailed circular design using a variety of materials including colored pencils, oil pastels, pens and markers. This will lead into another circular project where we will be using plaster in the future! Fifth grade is finishing up a value Zentangle painting where students were able to choose an image that had personal meaning to them for their Zentangle patterns, then chose a color to paint with value around their image. They are turning out beautiful! Soon we are going to pair off into groups to plan, design and create a collaborative mural! Students will see how working together to share ideas and create a large painting can be an enriching experience.
