## This month:

**English/Language Arts:** We visualized what was happening in fiction text to help us clarify what was happening the text. We also described key details and characters, setting, and major events both orally and in writing. We continued our routines for independent reading and writing, collaborative conversations, and workstations as small group instruction continued.

**Math:** We organized and interpreted data on pictographs and bar graphs. We also described numbers as representing amounts of tens and ones, and solved for the unknown in an equation by applying the meaning of the equal sign.

**Science:** We will identify ways animals send messages, and how observing these natural phenomena can help humans develop ways to communicate in other ways besides talking and writing. In Health, we will be identifying ways to take care of ourselves and keep our teeth healthy.

**Social Studies:** We will discuss and describe customs and traditions of families in our community.

## Next month:

**English/Language Arts:** We will learn how living things grow and change. We will read informational texts about the life cycle of a frog as well as that of an oak tree. We will also explore fiction, fables, and poetry featuring living things that grow and change. This unit is sure to inspire deeper interest in a fascinating topic that you can explore further at home.

**Math:** We will build on our learning of solving for the unknown in an equation by applying the meaning of the equal sign with a further investigation into word (story) problems. We will represent word problems with equations and solve them using a variety of problem-solving strategies.

**Science:** In Health, we will be identifying ways to take care of ourselves and keep our teeth healthy.

**Social Studies:** We will continue discussing and describing customs and traditions of families in our community.

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# Parent Notes:

We are continuing to work hard to get into a routine to maximize our instructional time. We have a few suggestions and reminders to support a smooth transition from home to school each day.

Now that the weather has become colder and the school-wide HVAC unit has been switched to heat, it can get very warm in the classrooms, so layers are encouraged. However, it is important for items worn to school to cause as little distraction as possible. Please talk with your child about keeping their hair and clothing in the same way it was when they left the house in the morning. We are having several jewelry, hairstyle and wardrobe changes throughout the day, causing disruption to instruction.

We have started to learn about dental health. One of the important concepts is keeping hands and other objects out of our mouths. However, many students have been putting their fingers and items from the classroom in their mouths. Many germs linger in schools, and putting fingers and items from home or the classroom in their mouth will cause a more significant spread of these germs. We will be using wipes on a regular basis to clean surface areas of the classroom, so please help us in our efforts by discussing the importance of keeping items out of their mouth with your child.

Many of you were so generous to donate tissues and hand sanitizer to our classrooms. Please encourage your child to use the tissues to take care of stuffiness or any discomfort with their noses. As stated above, it is important for us to prevent the spread of germs, so reinforcing our messages to use tissues instead of fingers and hands will help with this.

Please empty your child's backpack each day to review items in their folders and repack it with the items and materials necessary for school. Many students have been bringing toys to school, another significant distraction from learning. This can lead to unfocused attention on teaching and learning in the classroom and further exacerbate misbehavior. Folders should return the very next school day and toys should be left at home.

If you haven't already, please send in school supplies with your child. This includes 5 hardcover composition books and a set of headphones for use with computers and listening workstations. If you are willing to donate items to the classroom, crayons, tissues, hand sanitizer, disinfecting wipes, and resealable baggies are always needed and appreciated. Please talk with your child's teacher to discuss any needs specific to each classroom. We ALWAYS have a wish list!
