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More about the ASVAB: (ARMED SERVICES VOCATIONAL APTITUDE BATTERY)

The ASVAB is a career exploration test administered free to interested students in grades 10-12. The test helps identify a student's interests and aptitude in the following areas: verbal, math, science & technical skills.

When the individual scores are interpreted, students will learn how their interests & skills relate to the demands of more than 400 occupations, helping them to identify suitable career options.

The ASVAB is an excellent career exploration tool and we encourage students to take it to help them make realistic decisions about career paths based on their actual abilities, aptitudes and interests. It also meets state requirements for student portfolios and career assessments.

Students don't have to do any lengthy preparation to take the ASVAB. Getting a good night's rest and arriving on time to take the test are the two most important steps. As with other tests, how hard the student has studied and how much has been learned in school through the years will probably make the most difference in test results.
