WHO gets federal student aid?

The most basic eligibility requirements are that you must:

- demonstrate financial need;
- be a U.S. citizen or an eligible noncitizen;
- have a valid Social Security number;
- show you're qualified to obtain a college or career school education by earning a high school diploma or GED certificate.

What do I to need bring in to complete the FAFSA??? Student Info/Documentation:

- 1. Your W-2's for any job you worked in 2019
- 2. Your Social Security Number
- 3. Your Green Card Number (if you have one)
- 4. Amount of money in your bank account (if you have one)
- 5. Your Driver's License/Permit (if you have one)
- 6. Your e-mail address
- 7. List of colleges/tech schools you are planning to apply to

Parents Info/Documentation (that you live with):

- 1. Your Parent(s)' 2019 W-2's
- 2. Parent's copies of 2019 tax forms
- 3. Parent's Social Security Number(s)
- 4. Amount of money in your parent(s)' bank account
- 5. Parent's Birthdate(s) (month, date, AND year)
- Net worth of any stocks, bonds, Certificates of Deposit, or investments (only those NOT in retirement accounts)
- 7. Amount of child support received if any (monthly amt.)
- 8. Month and Year parents were married, separated, widowed, or divorced if applicable
- Does the family receive any of the following? Yes or NO and which ones – WIC, Free or Reduced Lunch, Temporary Assistance (TANF), Food Stamps, SSI

Federal student aid covers such expenses as tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and transportation. Aid can also help pay for a computer and dependent care. Check with your school's financial aid office to learn which programs the school participates in.
