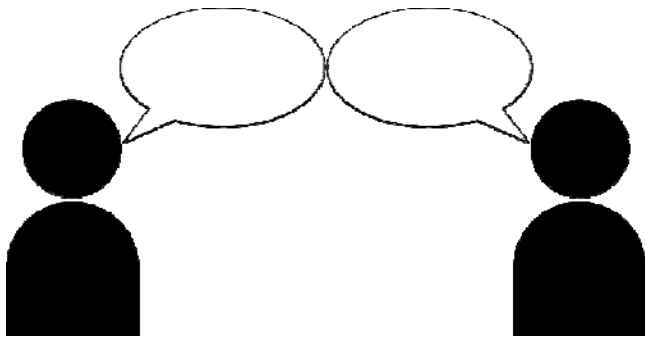

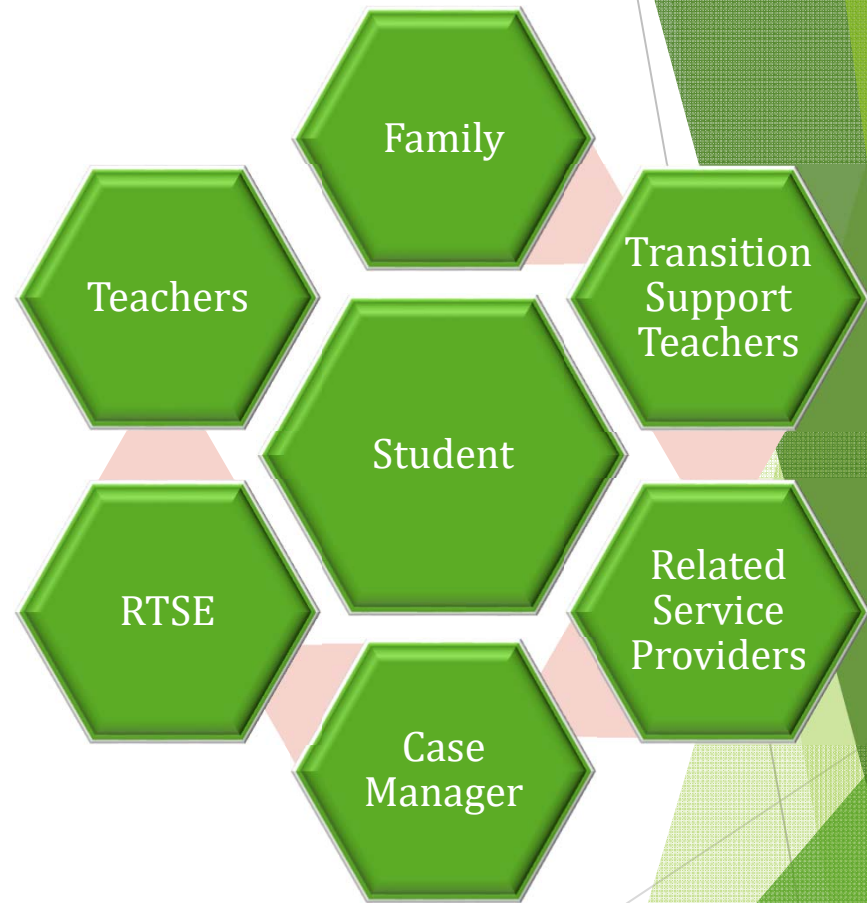

# The IEP Process

The IEP year your child reaches 14, a transition plan will be included and implemented.

Every year, a student completes Transition Interview which allows the IEP team to begin planning for the student's transition plan.

The plan includes Post-Secondary goals or outcomes, transition activities, and anticipated services.

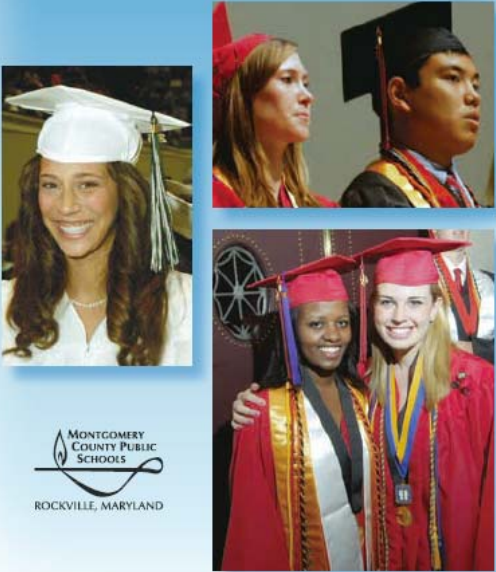

# MCPS Diploma Requirements

Students earn a high school diploma based upon successful fulfillment of four requirements:

- ▶ Enrollment (four years beyond 8<sup>th</sup> grade)
- ▶ Course Credit (22 credits)
- ▶ Passing of High School Assessments
- ▶ A minimum of 75 Student Service Learning Hours (SSL)

## MCPS GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS AT A GLANCE

The state of Maryland authorizes one diploma for all high school graduates, based upon successful fulfillment of four categories of requirements: enrollment, course credit, student service learning (SSL), and Maryland assessments. Students must satisfactorily complete four years beyond Grade 8 to meet the enrollment requirement. All other requirements are summarized in the table below. Consult the online MCPS Course Bulletin at [montgomeryschoolsmd.org/coursebulletin/](http://montgomeryschoolsmd.org/coursebulletin/) or your school counselor for further information.

<b>English</b>	<b>4 credits</b>		
<b>Fine Arts</b>	<b>1 credit</b> Selected courses in art, dance, drama/theater satisfy this requirement.		
<b>Health Education</b>	<b>0.5 credit</b>		
<b>Mathematics</b>	<b>4 credits</b> 1 full-year (A/B) algebra credit and 1 geometry credit required. Students who successfully complete a calculus course may be exempted from this 4-credit requirement. <b>NEW STATE REQUIREMENT FOR STUDENTS GRADUATING IN 2018 AND LATER:</b> Students graduating in 2018 and later must be enrolled in a math course each year in grades 9 through 12. This may result in students earning more than 4 credits in math for graduation.		
<b>Physical Education</b>	<b>1 credit</b>		
<b>Science</b>	<b>3 credits</b> 1 biology credit, and 1 physical science credit, must be included.		
<b>Social Studies</b>	<b>3 credits</b> 1 U.S. History credit; 1 World History credit; and 1 National, State, and Local Government credit required.		
<b>Technology Education</b>	<b>1 credit</b> Courses satisfying this requirement are designated in the Course Bulletin.		
<b>Electives:</b> The additional credits required for graduation may be fulfilled by one of the following three options	<b>OPTION 1</b>	<b>OPTION 2</b>	<b>OPTION 3</b>
	<b>2 credits</b> in a world language <b>OR</b> 2 credits in American Sign Language <b>AND</b> <b>2.5 credits</b> in elective courses	<b>2 credits</b> in advanced technology education <b>AND</b> <b>2.5 credits</b> in elective courses	<b>4 credits</b> in a state-approved Program of Study <b>AND</b> <b>0.5 credit</b> in electives courses
<b>Student Service Learning (SSL)</b>	75 service-learning hours		
<b>HSA and/or PARCC Assessments In:</b>	<p>Students expecting to graduate this school year (June or August 2015) will continue to meet their HSA graduation requirements (pass all HSAs; receive a combined passing score; or complete Bridge Plan projects).</p> <p>Students enrolled in Algebra 1 and English 10 in the 2014–2015 and 2015–2016 school years will take the PARCC assessments corresponding to those courses, but they will not be required to pass the PARCC assessments in order to graduate.</p> <p>Students enrolled in Algebra 1 and English 10 in the 2016–2017 school year and beyond will be required to pass the PARCC assessments in those courses, or complete Bridge Plan projects in order to graduate.</p> <p>Government and Biology HSAs are not impacted by the transition to PARCC and will continue as requirements. The Government and Biology HSAs and Bridge Plan options remain.</p> <p>Additional information regarding the revised graduation requirements is expected from the Maryland State Department of Education in Spring 2015.</p> <p>Updated information will be posted on the MCPS website as it becomes available.</p>		

# Post-Graduation Options



*Students who earn a **diploma** complete an approved high school program of studies*



Student has been enrolled in an education program for at least 4 years beyond Grade 8 and developed appropriate skills to enter the world of work, act responsibly as a citizen, and enjoy a fulfilling life *(as determined by the IEP team),*

OR

Student has been enrolled in an educational program for 4 years beyond 8<sup>th</sup> grade or its age equivalency, and has reached age 21

# HOW IS THE DIPLOMA OR CERTIFICATE DECISION MADE?

The IEP team considers:

1. Realistic Exit Outcomes
2. Maryland State Competency Tests and High School Assessments
3. Credit-Bearing Courses

When is the decision made?

The decision is made at the beginning of the student's last year in high school, unless the student is participating in alternative assessments







# Linkages to Adult Services



- ▶ As your child gets older, the Transition Support Teacher will assist in linking your son or daughter to adult service agencies.

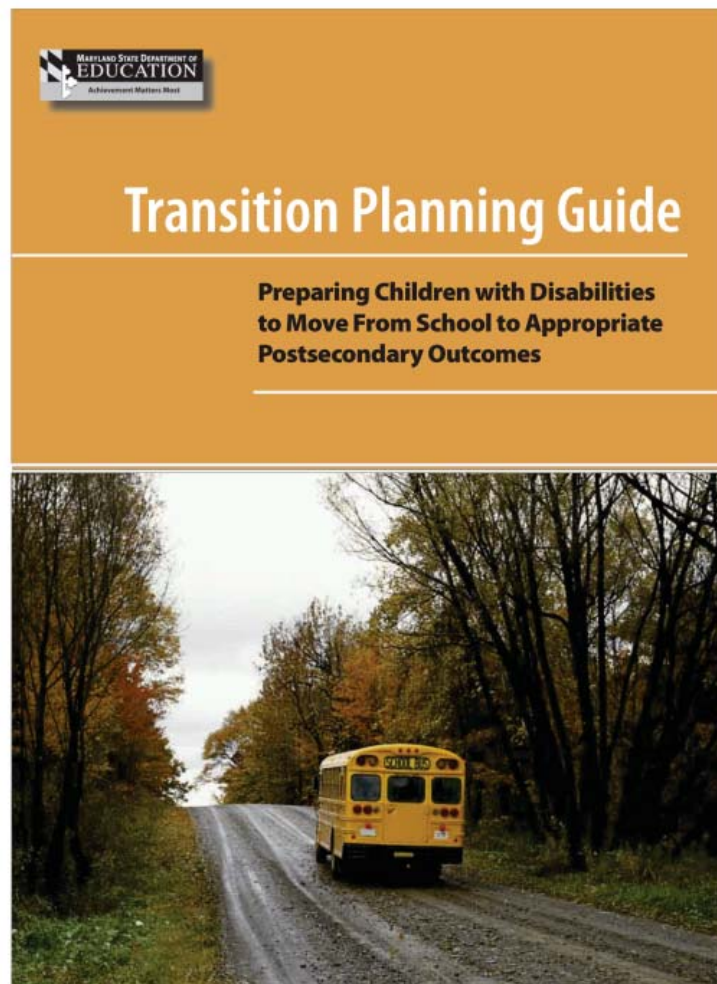
These agencies may include:

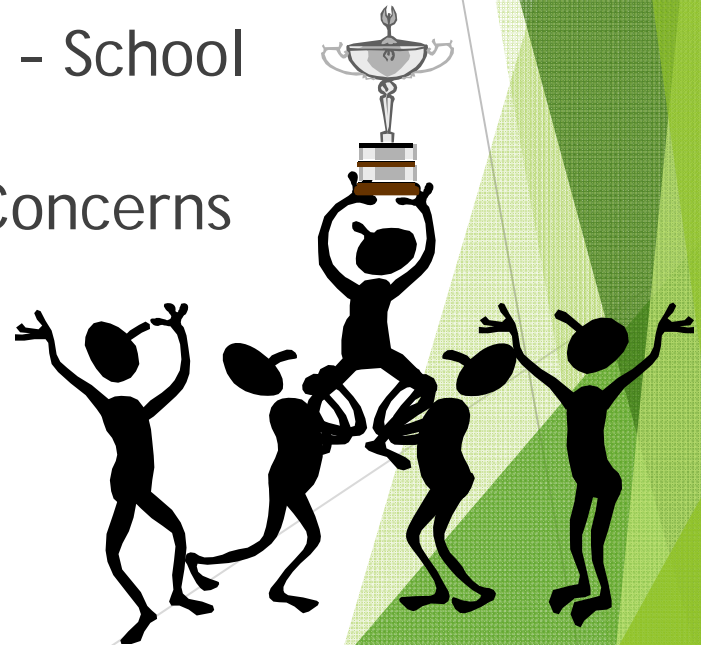

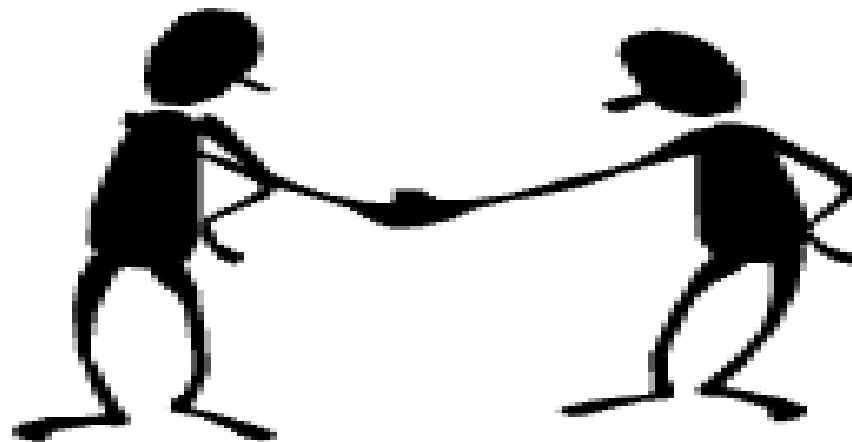
# We Are A Team
